Andrew Radde-Gallwitz has taught historical theology at Loyola since 2007. His book *Basil of Caesarea*, *Gregory of Nyssa*, *and the Transformation of Divine Simplcity* was the winner of a <u>Templeton Award for Theological Promise</u> for 2011. In his research, he focuses on the emergence of Christian beliefs and practices in late antiquity, with particular focus on the origins of the doctrine of the Trinity.



Mark DelCogliano teaches historical theology at the University of St. Thomas - Minnesota. His publications include *St. Basil of Caesarea: Against Eunomius* with Andrew Radde-Gallwitz and *Basil of Caesarea's Anti-Eunomian Theory of Names: Christian Theology and Late-Antique Philosophy in the Fourth-Century Trinitarian Controversy.* In his research, he particularly focuses on doctrinal debates and developments and the interpretation of scripture in early Christianity.
