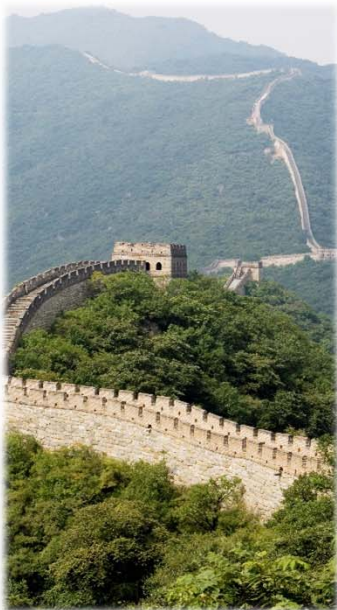

WHAT IS STUDY ABROAD?



Taking classes or doing an internship outside the United States and receiving academic credit towards your degree at Loyola.

Builds your resume

Better candidate for jobs

90% landed a job within 6 months

Make new connections

Why Should I Study Abroad?

Marketable for graduate school

90% who applied got into 1st and 2nd grad school choice

Enhance your Loyola experience

Ability to experience a new country

HOW LONG CAN I STUDY ABROAD FOR?

J-term

- Late December (after Christmas) – mid-January (before spring semester)

Spring break

Summer

- 3 – 12 weeks, contingent on program

Semester

Full year

WHERE WILL I LIVE?

- Homestays
 - Live with a local family
- Residence halls
 - Similar to residence halls in U.S.
 - Live with U.S., local, and/or international students
- Apartments
 - Live with U.S. or local students



AFFORDING STUDY ABROAD

- Costs = the same or less than Loyola tuition!
- State and federal financial aid can be used on ALL programs!
- Loyola scholarships can apply on some programs!

Jesuit university programs in: El Salvador, Spain, England, Philippines	\$13,000 - \$23,000	Generally included in tuition	Loyola, State, Federal

SCHOLARSHIPS

Gilman International Scholarship

- Up to \$5,000 to study/intern abroad
- Additional \$3,000 to study Critical Needs Language (Chinese, Arabic, Russian, Japanese, and more...)
- 1 in 5 student receive award
- Deadlines:
 - October (Summer, Spring study abroad)
 - March (Summer, Fall, & Academic Year study abroad)

Eligibility:

- Pell Grant recipient
- Must be abroad for minimum 4 weeks
- U.S. Citizen/permanent resident

Preference to:

- Diverse students (ethnicity, disability, STEM majors)
- Studying in non-traditional countries (not western Europe, Australia, New Zealand)
- Those who intern
- First generation college students



SCHOLARSHIPS, CONT.

Fund for Education Abroad Scholarship

- Up to \$10,000
- Deadlines: January 2016 (for summer 2016, fall 2016, spring 2017 study abroad)

Eligibility:

- U.S. Citizen/permanent resident
- Must be abroad for minimum 4 weeks

Preference to:

- Immersive/engaging programs
- Non-traditional countries (not western Europe, Australia, New Zealand)
- Foreign language study
- First generation college students
- Diverse students (ethnicity, disability, STEM majors)
- High financial need

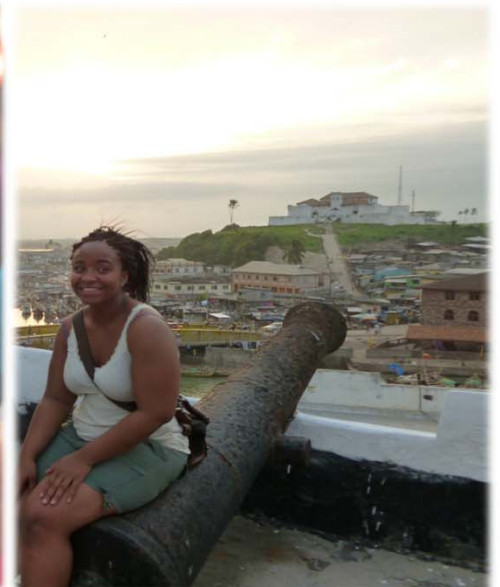
HOW TO SAVE UP TO STUDY ABROAD

- Open up a savings account
 - No access to debit card spending
 - Nickname savings account – “Aussie!”
- Plan for flight costs
 - Start searching early and often to identify price trends
 - Use websites (skyscanner.com; kayak.com) with travel predictor apps
- The power of visualization
 - Print a picture to keep in your wallet



HOW TO SPEND WHILE STUDYING ABROAD

- Be mindful and aware of conversion rates
 - Watch for trends and follow predictors – it might be worth it to transfer funds to a bank account overseas
- See if jobs are available overseas
 - Note taker, nanny, etc.



PREPARATION FOR ADULTHOOD

- Keep a weekly budget
- Consider books, bills, rent, food, entertainment, traveling...especially if not factored into your study abroad package



ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS & APPLICATION

- Full-time student
- 24 credit hours completed before start of program (12 hours for transfer students)
- 2.5 cumulative GPA
- Program-specific GPA/language requirements
- Good academic and disciplinary standing
- Apply for all programs online
