In 2013 he was the recipient of the prestigious Virgilio Elizondo Award from ACHTUS, given in recognition for distinguished achievement in theology.

Trinitarian theology, theological anthropology, political theology, and Latino/a theology. He is a prolific writer and public speaker. His publications include books, articles, and speeches, and he is now working on two books: Building Bridges: God, Diplomacy, and the Common Good and The Mystery of God in Latino/a Theology. He has contributed to efforts that bridge religion and foreign policy, especially through various efforts undertaken at the Department of State.

Díaz is married to Marian K. Díaz, also a theology professor at Loyola University Chicago, and together they are the proud parents of four children.
